## Step 1: A Winter Weather Report





## Step 2: Focus on New Vocabulary Words



Cold snap

Noun



A period of time when the temperature is abnormally cold and below the average temperature

We had a few cold snaps during the winter of 2014.

## To bundle up

**Phrasal verb** 



To put on many layers of clothing to protect against cold weather

If you plan to go out in the evening in January, you have to bundle up.

Mild

**Adjective** 



Not strong, moderate, the opposite of extreme

We are expecting a mild winter with an average temperature of 45 degrees.

### **Flurries**

Noun



Light flakes of snow that usually occur before the snow gets more intense

It's not snowing too hard outside, there are just a few flurries here and there.

Taper off

Phrasal verb



To gradually reduce in intensity. This term is only used to talk about the intensity of snow.

It snowed for a while this morning and then it tapered off.

Pick up

**Phrasal verb** 



### To increase in intensity and strength

The snow picked up after lunch and now it is snowing quite hard.

### **Snow showers**

noun



# Snow coming down with a lot of intensity and speed, accumulating quickly

We had snow showers all weekend so we couldn't take the car out.

Black ice

noun



A thin coating of transparent ice on a surface, usually on the road or sidewalk

When you walk early in the morning, watch out for black ice.



# Step 6: Practice with a Native Conversation 1

Please role play the following situation using these phrases and then switch roles: Black ice, cold snap, flurries

**Conversation partner:** You are hoping to go out this evening to a nightclub but the weather is bad-start the conversation- "Hey-let's go out tonight...."

**Student**: your friend wants to go out but you want to stay home because of the bad weather

Bonus Conversation 1: Please use the phrases from Say It Another Way (A= friend, B= friend)

A: (student) Hey let's go out tonight. I know it just started snowing, but it's only \_\_\_\_(flurries).

B: No way- I'm staying in. We're in the middle of a \_\_\_\_\_ (cold snap)

A: Ah come on. Don't be such a whimp.

## Bonus conversation 1 answers

#### Bonus Conversation 1: Please use the phrases from Say It Another Way (A= friend, B= friend)

A: Ah come on. Don't be such a whimp.

B: I'm not being a whimp. I just don't feel like slipping on a sheet of clear ice and breaking my neck.

# Step 6: Practice with a Native Conversation 2

Please role play the following situation using these phrases and then switch roles: taper off, mild, snow showers

**Conversation partner:** You just got into a car accident because you were driving in the snow. Tell your partner what happened.

**Student**: You are worried about your friend. Ask about the accident. Start the conversation- Hey there's a huge dent in the car, what happened?

#### Bonus Conversation 2: Please use the phrases from Say It Another Way (A= friend, B= friend)

- A: (student) Hey you have a bump on your forehead and there's a dent in the car door. What happened?
- B: Oh I got into an accident. The\_\_\_\_\_ (snow showers) had \_\_\_\_\_ (tapered off) and the weather seemed \_\_\_\_\_ (mild) so I went out for a drive.
- A: But I guess you didn't realize that there was still a lot of snow on the roads. Did you lose control of the car?
- B: Yeah, I went into a ditch and hit another car on the side of the road.
- A: Well, let's call the insurance company. I'm glad you're ok at least.

# Step 6: Practice with a Native Conversation 3

Please role play the following situation using these phrases and then switch roles: pick up, bundle up

**Conversation partner:** You climbed Mt. Everest last year in a blizzard. Tell the story.

**Student**: You are curious about climbing Mt. Everest and you ask your friend to tell you about his/her experience. Start the conversation- So I heard you climbed Mt. Everest last year in the middle of a blizzard, what was that like.....?

#### Bonus Conversation 3: Please use the phrases from Say It Another Way (A= friend, B= friend)

A: (student) So I heard you climbed Mt. Everest last year? What was that like? You must have really \_\_\_\_(bundled up)

B: Oh yes, I did. It was a scary experience actually. I am lucky to be around to talk about it. I would never climb it again in February.

A: Really? Tell me more

B: Well the weather service said it was a mild February so it was ok to climb, but when we were halfway up the mountain, the winds\_\_\_\_\_ (picked up) and a storm came in.

- Describe the weather in the wintertime in your hometown using some of the words from this module.
- O How do you feel about the weather in your hometown? Does it suit your personality and your lifestyle?
- What is the best season for weather in your hometown?
- Describe one of your best "weather memories" (a big snowstorm spent inside with family, a
  rainstorm, a heat wave where you spent the week at the beach)

## More questions

- To what extent do you think that the weather influences our mood? Do you think that it's true that warmer and sunnier climates tend to make people friendlier?
- What differences do you notice in your home country between the warm places and the cold places?
- In your opinion, what is the best way to spend a snow day? (Inside reading by the fire, outside playing in the snow, etc.)
- If you could choose to live permanently in a warm or a cold climate, which one would you choose and why?
